GENERAL PHOTOGRAPHIC TECHNIQUES

COMPOSE YOURSELF AND SEE THE LIGHT

Three Hour Lecture - Sat. - for N, I, A.

Ken Sklute, Tempe, AZ Canon Explorer of Light

As photographers, we all look at the world and see things uniquely. We often move too fast and miss what is right in front of us. Canon Explorer of Light, Ken Sklute will share his perspective, teach you to see and help you to be more in touch with your creative vision. We routinely pass magnificent locations without stopping because we are not really seeing what is there. Sklute will explain how he goes about finding locations, subjects and photographic environments that yield award winning results. Together, we will explore creative ways of composing. You will learn to see light that carves your subject with grace, depth and dimension. Sklute will motivate and ignite your passion, enabling you to take your craft to a new level of excellence. Sklute will share thoughts regarding traditional and contemporary interpretations of composition. We will discuss the rule of thirds, rules of fifths, dutch angles, negative space and other elements that help take mediocre images and raise them to unique! Sklute will address unique capture techniques such as HDR, timelapse as well as using video capture in today's HDSLR cameras to round out your storytelling abilities!

PHOTOGRAPHING WILDLIFE - FROM PORTRAITS TO ACTION

One Hour Lecture - Sat. only - for N, I, A.

This exciting educational program will cover everything you will need to know about photographing wildlife in the field. The photographic journey will cover exotic locations such as Tanzania but also include many tips for photographing wildlife closer to home in some unexpected places. Minimum gear requirements will be discussed for both the safety of the wildlife and the photographer. Camera settings will be covered including what mode to use as well as choosing the right ISO for wildlife portrait work as well as action photography. There will be plenty of image examples showing how those settings will provide impact to your images. The program concludes with an in-depth segment on photographing birds in flight. COLOR, CONTRAST AND COMPOSITION

One Hour Lecture followed by Two Hour Outdoor Workshop – Fri. & Sat. N, I, A.

Andre Cabuche, Kelowna, BC

The first part of this workshop is a 1-hour slide program on *colour*, *contrast* and *composition* with the underlying theme of creating images with impact! The slide program has been designed to help photographers understand:

- how to use colour effectively;
- how contrast between visual elements can be used to control how and what the viewer will 'see' in a composition;
- how to use contemporary art styles of composition to break away from the staid, old-fashioned classic styles that are prevalent in photo competitions.

The slide presentation will include 10 photographic 'exercises' that will be on a 'hand-out' sheet to be distributed at the end of the slide program. The exercises are designed to help reinforce the visual art techniques that are introduced in the slide program.

The second part of the workshop is a 2-hour outdoor practical camera session that will enable participants to start working on the 10 exercises. The practical session will immediately follow the lecture.

<u>Equipment recommended</u>: digital camera, zoom lens, lens shade. (Optional: lightweight tripod.)

A former instructor for professional photography, André is highly suited to leading photography and visual arts workshops. For more than 35 years he has been a popular workshop leader at SWMCCC, most notably in portrait and glamour photography. In the past few years, he has presented programs on various visual art topics such as composition, colour, perception and visual literacy. After studying art and design in Toronto, André worked as a professional photographer for the Canadian Forces for 30 years, where he specialized in studio and 'on-location' illustrative photography. He also worked in audiovisual production, script writing and graphic arts. Recipient of numerous national and international awards for his photographic work, André was awarded the distinction of 'AFIAP' (Artist) in 1979 by the Federation Internationale De L'Art

Photographique in Europe. In 1994 he was invested into the Order of Military Merit by the Governor General of Canada. André now lives in the Okanagan Valley, the picturesque wine region of British Columbia, where he freelances in photography, AV production and leading workshops.

SEEING THINGS

Two hour Lecture - Fri. & Sat. - for N, I, A.

James Cook, Saugatuck, MI

Creating great images is a matter of seeing them in the first place. Practiced observation plus awareness of light and composition is what enables some photographers to consistently turn seemingly ordinary scenes into exceptional images. This seminar is about creating art rather than photographs. It starts with a dialog in defining art and what makes a photograph art. The discussion moves on to how to be more observant and to thoughtfully explore visual opportunities. Then it turns to how to work out the best angles and compositions and why one may work better than others.

For over three decades James Cook, an internationally respected photojournalist, has observed and photographed America's people and places. The results appear worldwide in prestigious publications including Time, Newsweek, Forbes and The Washington Post. Many of his images are held in museum, private and corporate collections. Over the course of his career Cook has photographed many renowned leaders of our generation including major motion picture personalities, corporate and political leaders, as well as U.S. Presidents. His portraits include Henry Fonda, Anthony Quinn, Gerald Ford, Peter Drucker and Frank Sinatra. Among notable clients are Kodak, Sony, Minolta, The Ford Foundation and the Nature Conservancy. He worked extensively for the Associated Press contributing to most of the nation's major newspapers. James Cook was prominently featured in a nationally televised PBS special on contemporary photographers for his award winning photographic documentary on Native Americans. Photography from that documentary is now housed in the permanent collection of the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D.C. He has served as an officer and director of the American Society of Media Photographers (ASMP) and has been a featured speaker at numerous professional photographic conferences and gatherings. In 2009, he co-founded the Saugatuck Photographic Workshops in Saugatuck, Michigan.

INS AND OUTS OF FLOWER PHOTOGRAPHY

One Hour Lecture followed by a One Hour Outdoor Workshop Fri., Sat.. & Sun. – for **N, I, A.**

Michael Kobe, Munster, IN

The presentation will focus on appropriate equipment for taking pictures of flowers, techniques employed in close-up photography, and post image capture editing. These three components will dramatically help anyone interested in mastering close-up photography of flowers. After the presentation, participants may opt to bring their cameras and tripods to a 60 minute workshop to practice the skills in flower photography that I have shown them at the presentation. All ability levels will be addressed and equipment needs can vary from a pocket point and shoot camera to a digital single lens reflex camera.

Michael is a retired Biologist. After teaching for forty-four years, he decided to pursue his interest in the out-of-doors through photography. He has mastered the skills of nature photography and shares them through extensive workshops, seminars, and field trips with others. His photographs have been utilized extensively in National Park publications. He is recognized for his nature photography especially in his skills of capturing images of insects, flowers, and birds. He has won many awards with his photographs and was honored by the Chicago Area Camera Clubs Association with the prestigious Kohout Nature Award in 2009 and the Grace DeWolf Nature Photography Award in 2011.

LANDSCAPE AND SPORTS PHOTOGRAPHY - NATURALLY

One Hour Lecture - Thur., Sat. & Sun. - for N, I, A.

Gerald Emmerich, East Troy, WI FPSA

The first half of the program will present images of some of the most photogenic landscapes in the lower 48 – the mountains and wildlife of Colorado, the Pacific Coast of Oregon, lighthouses along the coast of Maine, desert landscapes of Monument Valley, and the natural wonders and wildlife of Yellowstone. The second half of the program will present action photos, including paragliding in the grand landscape of the Palouse, kayaking the Wisconsin River, and surfing in the big waves of Oahu's North Shore, as well bike racing in East Troy and college basketball in Hawaii. The presentation will provide information on where and how the images were made, with emphasis on composition and lighting and the basics of photography.

Gerry joined the Photographic Society of America (PSA) in 1979, and his service to the Society has covered many positions, including Chapters Committee Chair; International Conference Committee Equipment Chair, Chapters Showcase Director, Photo Travel TOPS Chair, PSA Wisconsin Chapter Chair, and Region Director for PSA Region 21. In 2001 Gerry was awarded PSA's Region Director of the Year award, and in 2003 he was the recipient of PSA's Peabody Award for General Photography. In 2012 He received the prestigious President's Award. Gerry served on the PSA Board of Directors as PSA Conventions Vice President from 2003 to 2009 and served as PSA Secretary and member of the PSA Executive and Finance Committees from 2009 to 2013. Gerry has been a member of the Image Makers Camera Club since 1975. He served as the chairman for the Image Makers International Exhibition (Wisconsin Circuit) from 1996 to 2013, and he presented all of the shows for the Wisconsin Circuit. He is also a charter member of the East Troy Viewfinders and has served as chairman for the Viewfinders International Exhibition (North Star Circuit) since 2001. Gerry is a multiple-galaxy exhibitor in four PSA Divisions – Projected Image, Nature, Photojournalism, and Photo Travel; and he has been a PSA TOPS contributor in four Divisions since 2003. He has over 5,800 acceptances in international exhibitions, including 33 best of show awards. Since 2000 Gerry has been listed in PSA's Who's Who in Photography as a top exhibitor in North America, often in four divisions, and he was first in the world in the projected Photojournalism Division section in 2011. His photos of Hawaii were featured in the "Distinctive Image" article in the September 2004 PSA Journal, and his photos of unique natural areas in Wisconsin were featured in The Nature Conservancy (TNC-Wisconsin) calendars from 1992 through 2009.

USING FLASH WITH CONTINUOUS LIGHT

One Hour Lecture - Fri., Sat. & Sun. - for N, I. A.

David Stroup, Goshen, IN

Using Flash with Continuous Light can add a new and exciting level to your images. Flashes can be used to enhance your images by Using flash with Bright sun light, Using flash in low light, High Speed Sync vs. Slow shutter speeds and On camera and off camera techniques.

I first started taking photos in 1988 when I got my first "real" camera. It was an all manual camera and not knowing anything about photography I made a lot of mistakes, which prompted me to learn as much as I could to get better. Now a few years later, I find that I have lot more to learn. (But I'm enjoying every second of it) I now have 10 years of camera store retail and camera repair experience, and 9 years photographing at events (high school and military reunions) where I have a small studio set up and shoot candid photos.

DIGISCOPING

One Hour Lecture - Thurs. eve., Fri. & Sat. - for N, I, A.

Wayne Pope, Okemos, MI

"Digiscoping is the art of using a digital camera to take photos through an optical telescope. Usually, a compact point-and-shoot digital camera is mounted with a bracket or adapter to the eyepiece of a bird watcher's spotting scope. Recent improvements in digiscoping mounting brackets now permit the use of full-size digital single lens reflex cameras. This one-hour class will cover digiscoping equipment and techniques and help the student become more successful in bird photography. Digiscoping will also be compared to traditional methods of bird photography that use digital cameras and autofocus lenses."

Wayne is a photography instructor in the Visual Arts & Media Department at Lansing Community College. He teaches Basic Photo, Nature Photography, Special Effects Photography, and Photography for Scrap Booking. Wayne and his wife, Melinda, operate Pope Photography in Okemos, MI and do weddings and portraits. Wayne also does corporate and environmental photography. UNDERSTANDING YOUR CAMERA

One Hour Lecture – Fri., & Sat. – for N.

Mike Mueller, Bridgeport, MI

We will be looking at the camera operations, including the different mode settings and selections and metering modes. We will discuss how to determine exposure settings and explore the use of ISO settings, white balance selections and formatting. We will look at

the use of RAW and JPG, and lenses and lens selection. Bring camera, lenses and camera manual to the class. There will be time for questions and hopefully answers.

CAMERA AND PHOTO WALK

Two Hour Workshop – Fri. & Sat.. – for N, I.

We will be exploring the automatic, aperture, shutter, manual and program settings of the camera. We will cover use of metering modes, ISO setting and white balance. We will discuss lens types, fixed and zoom, as well the lens setting apertures. We will answer questions about RAW and JPG as well as your equipment. Bring camera, This will be hands-on out on the streets of Holland.

Mike has been an active photographer for many years. He is a member of the Frankenmuth Camera Club and Photographic Society of America. He has taught community education classes in photography and has lectured many times to various groups. He is past president of SWMCCC and held many other positions within the council and SWMCCC made him Honorary for his service to the Council. He has earned acceptances and honors for his images at local, council and international levels. PSA has made him an Associate (APSA) for his service to the society.

FLOWERS - CLOSE UP

Two Hour Workshop – Fri., Sat. & Sun. – for N, I, A.

Richard States, Cortland, OH

This workshop will provide the opportunity to photograph a variety of individual flowers. This will be an indoor workshop so wind and lighting will not be a problem. Various backgrounds will be supplied. A short program on tips on macro photography will be given then plenty of time to shoot. All flowers will be fresh cut flowers. The photographer will need to bring your camera, tripod and cable release (or use the camera self timer). A macro lens is best, but you can use a zoom in the 100-200 mm range, or the macro mode on some lenses. Information on white balance will also be provided during the program.

Richard is a horticulturist, educator, and published author of educational slide series. He has been a horticulture instructor with the Warren City Schools for 35 years. He has authored seven educational slide series and co-authored three others. These slide series were published by the Ohio State University and sold throughout the United States. Richard, a member of the Warren Camera Club, has won many first-place awards and slide-of-the-year many times. In 2003 he won his fourth PSA gold medal (the Warren Club is in the top A group in the United States) and many honorable mentions. Richard has had many of his pictures on magazine covers and in advertising campaigns. His specialty is close-ups of flowers, and he presents programs for camera and garden clubs on how to photograph flowers close-up.

BLACK LIGHT/WHITE LIGHT

Two Hour Workshop - Thurs. eve., Fri. & Sat. - for N, I, A.

Claude & Kay Butcher, Lansing, MI

Claude and Kay will teach the use of black light and white light to achieve unusual photographs. They will provide materials for varying set-ups to enhance the experience. After a short slide presentation, the room will be darkened to allow the participants to photograph set-ups of their choosing. Film shooters should use daylight film.

Claude and Kay are past presidents of the Lansing Camera Club. They have presented this workshop for a number of times at the Summer Weekend of Photography. Claude retired from Oldsmobile division of General Motors after 42 years. Kay worked at Michigan State University for 40 years prior to retirement. They have traveled extensively in the United States and Canada, enjoying the remote areas of the country.

One Hour Demonstration – Sat. – for **N**, **I**, **A**. Jerry will demonstrate the procedure and techniques for printing photographs directly from your mobile device.

WHAT'S NEW IN ADOBE PHOTOSHOP ELEMENTS 12

3 hour workshop – Fri. & Sun. – for **N**, **I**.

Bill Brown and Mark Southard, Chicago, IL

How to make your images look great with the 'Quick', the Guided and the Expert Modes available in the best software value ever! How to use the 'Quick', the 'Guided', and the 'Expert' modes to recompose, crop, to correct crooked buildings. And to show you how to 'burn' the edges (vignetting), and to add borders for dramatic framing, Demonstrate 'high key' technique for fashion images. Create 'out of bounds', reflections for creative images. We will show how to use a one button technique to correct exposures and to improve color balance. You will learn how to create selections to make great composites using several layers. And you will finish off an image by adding a drop shadow frame and putting your own signature and copyright symbol on each image.

You will need to have a laptop computer with which you are familiar.

Photoshop Elements 12.0 looks dramatically different from older versions, so Mark and Bill will walk you through the changes. It is recommend that you either have the latest version of Elements, or the 11.0, 10.0 or 9.0 version.

Please note that this is not a class on how to use your computer. There won't be time to slow down the class to show people how to navigate their laptop or there isn't enough time to cover the material. If you don't feel you have the basic computer skills, you can sit with someone else and still become familiar with the material being covered and benefit from the session.

Bill Brown has been in photography since 1955. He has had his own photography business for more than 35 years. Bill now produces fine art images for sale. Since 1999 he has been shooting digitally and now shoots only with digital equipment. He is past president of the Chicago Area Camera Club Association and teaches Adobe Photoshop, Elements, the process of shooting HDR and basic digital photography throughout the Chicago Area Camera Clubs and colleges. He has also presented programs at The Chicago Area Photographic School, which is held in the Chicago area every two years. Bill teaches at the Clearing in Door County and has presented several programs at SWMCC. Bill is a member of P.S.A., past president of CACCA, past president and founder of The Elgin Area C.C., and is also a member of Elgin Area Camera Club and Lake County Camera Club.

Mark Southard is a well-known photographer and has conducted many photographic classes and workshops. He has been a creative use consultant for Polaroid as a fine art black and white photographer. He has been teaching Elements since version 2.0. Mark teaches in the Chicago area, The Clearing in Door County and also on many occasions has presented at the Photographic Society of America.

DIGITAL WORKFLOW USING LIGHTROOM

Four Lectures – Fri. only – for N, I.

Jeffrey R. Klug, Hubertus, WI

The 4 sections of classes covers Digital workflow using Lightroom, Photoshop (or Photoshop Elements), different plug-in filters for making your workflow go faster and finally outputting your images either as prints, books or a slideshow.

Section 1 (1 hour) - Importing your images and cataloguing them in Lightroom library module. I will show different ways to import your images. Show how to use Photo Mechanic to edit large files. Then in Lightroom show different ways to rate an image and the quickest way to get rid of images you don't want. I will explore the use of keywords and how to search for images.

Section 2 (1 hour) - Explaining the tools in the Develop module in Lightroom. I will explain the tools in the Develop module, showing how each one works. How to create presets along with sync setting from one image to another.

Section 3 (1 hour) - Processing your image in the Develop module, then working with Photoshop and the different plug-in filters. I will process some images using different plugins and work them in Photoshop. I will show how to use the plug-ins (Nik Filters, OnOne Perfect Photo Suite, Intensify Pro and Topaz filters). I will talk about using Photoshop, when to use it and where in the process to use it.

Section 4 (2 hours) - Outputting your images - printing out your image using the print module. Creating presets to make printing go faster. Showing how easy it is to make a

book in the Book Module. Finally how to make and show a slide show using the Slide show module.

Jeffrey Klug's interest in photography began in high school as a photographer for the school newspaper and yearbook. Governor Margaret Farrow. In 1993 he became the manager of the Apple Barn/Killdeer Acres taking over for his father, the late Richard P. Klug. Later he converted the Apple Barn to an art gallery where he sells his fine arts photographs. In 2008, he brought back the name "Klug's Photo World" and added a frame shop. Jeffrey, as a Certified Photographic Counselor, teaches classes in photography, Adobe Photoshop, and Lightroom at the UW-Waukesha and Washington County, Moraine Park Technical College and at Wisconsin Area Camera Clubs Organization (WACCO). He was president, program chair, competition chair, and treasurer of the Wisconsin Area Camera Clubs Organization; treasurer and program director for the Wisconsin Imaging and Photographic Association (WIPA); program co-chair and past president of the Menomonee Falls Camera Club. His favorite things to photography are auto and motorcycle racing at Road America, while also photographing Lighthouses and Waterfalls. HDR - HIGH DYNAMIC RANGE IMAGING

One Hour Lecture - Fri., Sat. & Sun. - for N, I, A.

Hazel Meredith, New Haven, CT APSA, MNEC

Our eyes can see a much greater dynamic range of tones in a scene than our digital cameras. A way to capture what we see is to take multiple exposures of a scene by bracketing (taking one "correct" exposure and the one or more over-exposed shots and one or more under-exposed shots to capture the range of light in the scene). You can then merge these photos in a dedicated program such as Photomatix Pro by HDRsoft, or Nik's HDR Efex Pro. Photoshop has some HDR capabilities as well, and you can do a "pseudo" HDR effect with plug-ins such as Topaz. I will demonstrate the process from taking the images through processing using all of these programs.

Hazel is involved with the photographic community on local, regional and national levels. She is currently treasurer and webmaster of the Greater Bridgeport Camera Club; member of the New Haven Camera Club; secretary of the Connecticut Association of Photographers; and a Vice President on the board of the New England Camera Club Council. She is also active in the Photographic Society of America and is the Camera Club & Council News Columnist for the PSA "Journal". Her photos have won many awards and competitions in the past few years in both local club competitions and international salons.

She has over 125 acceptances in PSA-sanctioned exhibitions, and she has also received four bronze stars and two silver stars for her journalistic efforts. In 2008, she received an honors distinction of Master Member of the New England Camera Club Council (MNEC) during its annual conference and in 2012 received the PSA Service Award. In September, 2013, she was awarded the distinction of APSA from the Photographic Society of America at their annual conference. Hazel currently teaches for the Milford and North Haven Adult Education programs as well as at local camera clubs and many regional conferences. She enjoys being active in the photographic community and helping others find the joy and satisfaction in taking and perfecting beautiful images.
